

For the period ended 31st December, 1976

Not only should these services be available and accessible, but people must be aware of them.

Each year, the number of aged in our community increases and activity in the field of aged care grows, placing additional strain on this Council to meet its objectives. Unfortunately, the growth of work has not been matched by the same degree of income at a time when it is also costing more, due to the effects of inflation, to carry out the existing services. As a result, the work that has been done is left to a small number of paid staff and a lot of voluntary effort provided by members of committees. Your Executive is determined to continue to fight for and to contribute to an increase in the range of and standard of services provided for old people.

It has established a Projects and Priority Committee, in order to determine, firstly that the limited resources are channelled towards work with the highest priority, and secondly to endeavour to obtain more project funding to allow for an expanded programme.

## **EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE**

Your Executive Committee was delighted when our Vice-Chairman Dame Ada Norris received further recognition of her work for the community when she was elevated to the order of Dame of the British Empire.

At the 1976 Annual Meeting the following members were re-elected to the Executive.

The year also saw losses and gains in the composition of the Executive.

Mr. Howden retired as Chairman in October and from the Executive in November prior to moving from Melbourne.

During his eight years on the Executive Mr. Howden played a major role as a Vice-Chairman, Convenor of the Accommodation Committee and a member of many Sub-Committees. As Chairman he was also an active Director of the Australian Council on the Ageing. We regret the loss of Mr. Howden's services but wish him well in his retirement.

Mr. Neville Brooke was elected Chairman in October and has already shown a positive style of leadership that augurs well for the future.

Mr. Arthur Leggo resigned in March ending a short term on the Committee.
Dr. Cyril Burt representative of the Mental Health Authority retired in June ending five years of service to the Executive and he has been replaced by Dr. C. J. M. Van Tiggelen.

Mrs. Joan Hopper also found it necessary to resign in December after four years of valuable service. The Committee placed on record appreciation of her many services and activities for the Council.

Other new members to the Executive Committee during the year were Mr.

Lionel Adams whose many years of service in the geriatric field is proving invaluable, Mrs. Dorothy Eaton, Senior Social Worker with the Presbyterian Department of Social Services and Mr. Jim Wilson representing Melbourne Rotary Club.

Copies of the addresses of each of these speakers are available and we record appreciation to each of them.

In addition Mr. Cliff Picton who was a co-opted member was appointed to fill a casual vacancy among full members of the Executive Committee

At the Australian Council on the Ageing Annual Meeting and Conference Mr. Howden and Mrs. Hopper were official representatives of the Victorian Council on the Ageing. Many other members attended and Dr. Van Tiggelen was a principal speaker.

## **COUNCIL MEETINGS**

During the year three quarterly meetings and Annual meeting of members and associate members were held at the Sheraton Hotel.

Each meeting had the same format — A speaker in the morning followed by lunch and then general discussion in the afternoon.

It is pleasing that, with a new venue and the present format, plus excellent speakers, attendances at the four meetings was an increase on previous years.

## PREVENTIVE REMEDIAL CARE

In 1974 the Council emphasized the need for more preventive care and in the period that has elapsed more and more focus has been placed on this aspect of aged care.

The Council has been involved in the following ways:—

- A submission to the Minister of Health regarding the need for increased subsidies for the running of elderly citizens clubs and hot meal services.
- In conjunction with the Home Economics Association the development of a suitable cookery book "Cooking for One or Two".
- The development of a pilot programme of "Foster Grandparents" which will utilise the skills of elderly people for the benefit of younger people.
- 4. Planning a State-wide Clubs Conference of the 330 Senior Citizens Clubs
- In conjunction with Prahran Institute
  of Technology developing a programme to instruct volunteer craft
  leaders to work in Senior Citizens
  Clubs. It is envisaged that eighty will
  be trained during the next year.
- 6. Submissions to -
  - A) The Premiers Working Party on Domiciliary Care.
  - B) The Federal Committee on Care of the Aged and Infirm.

- Further developments in the field of Care of Aged Migrants. The Council will now work closely with Migrant Groups to develop more services.
- 8. Early Planning for Retirement Association.

Close co-operation and assistance to this Association in its development of programmes throughout industry and the community. The Council provided speakers on some fifty occasions.

- Large Print Newspaper. The Council was pleased to co-perate with the Committee work with the Age newspaper to develop the large print newspaper.
- 10. Public speaking on preventive care to a wide variety of audiences.
- In conjunction with the Council of Adult Education developing programmes including the proposed Monday Group.

Many of these programmes will be continued in the coming year and more will need to be developed, particularly the further development of the use of elderly citizens clubrooms, educational programmes and community awareness.

- 12. Day Hospitals and Day Centres. A report prepared by an expert Committee defines the role and function of each of these Day Care Services. Copies are available at a cost of 75c plus postage.
- 13. Regional Committees on the Ageing. The responsibility of these Committees and the method of formation are the subject of another expert report. Copies are available at a cost of 75c.

## RESIDENTIAL CARE

### ASSESSMENT

Following earlier statements by the Council that Assessment was the key to Total Care and particularly important in deciding the need for institutional care the Executive Committee set up a subcommittee to draw up an expert paper defining assessment.

Copies of this are available at a cost of \$1.25 plus postage.

### MEDICAL RECORDS

Concern over both the availability of accurate medical records and of the use that can be made of information contained therein led to the establishment of an expert Committee to draw up a paper on Medical Records in Geriatric Hospitals.

A copy of this paper is also available at a cost of 75 cents plus postage.

## SUBMISSIONS

Submissions were made to Government enquiries on all aspects of aged care, particularly on matters of residential care needs, training of staff for residential care including Geriatricians, Nursing, Para-Medical and other staff.

Your Executive Committee also made submissions to the State Minister of Health on the quality of Special Accommodation Houses and the number of inspectors available to support existing regulations.

The Committee also expressed concern as the lack of sufficient accommodation for the frail and sick aged in this State and the delays in obtaining more beds.



# CENTRAL INFORMATION REFERRAL SERVICE

As a result of moves initiated by your

Council funds were made available to the Hospitals and Charities Commission for a pilot project to operate in the Mt. Eliza area.

Following completion of the project a meeting was called to consider the report and steps were taken to continue the operation of such a service in the Mt. Eliza area. It is envisaged that further services on a regional basis will gradually be introduced.



## INFORMATION AND ADVISORY SERVICE

During the year this service assisted 2,200 people, almost the same number as the previous year.

This was notable as, during the year Miss Strahan acted as Director for ten weeks while the Director was absent on sick leave.

Twenty one home visits were also undertaken.

Many of the enquiries were for accommodation either independent living, supportive care or nursing care. In the latter categories it was often necessary, because of the present critical position, to make twenty, thirty or forty phone calls to find an available bed, thus magnifying the work load (and the phone account).

Six social studies students from four different faculties undertook placement at the Council during the year.

The Information and Advisory Service also provides valuable support and advice to Sub-Committees and to the Executive.

We would like to record appreciation of the valuable work of Miss Isobel Strahan particularly for the way in which she took over the Director's role so capably on two occasions.

It should also be recorded that this service has a multi-functional role —

- . Direct assistance to the elderly or their relatives
- . Advice to the Executive on areas of need and trends
- . General community advice through public speaking
- Representation on committees both internal and external as a source of specialist information.

Without support such as that given by the William Buckland Foundation, whose grant of \$5,000 was specifically towards the cost of running this service, this invaluable service must suffer from lack of adequate resources.



## FINANCE

Without any increase in staff total expenditure rose from \$67,507 to \$72,650.

\$2,100 of this increase was in printing costs, largely related to the production "Cooking for One or Two" and the reprint of the Directory of Services. On the other hand income from Sale of publications rose from \$3,322 in 1975 to \$6,709 in 1976.

Salaries increased \$3,000 and rent \$800. Postage and Telephone Costs increased \$200 despite a severe cutback on mailing lists, postage of quarterly addresses and other economies.

Total income fell by \$726 but 1975 figures included special non-recurring amounts of \$5,644. In effect this means a real increase of \$4,900 for this year despite a reduction in Australian Government grant of \$5,225. State Government grant increased \$500 to \$6.500.

The most pleasing factor to your Executive was the increase in donations from individuals, companies and Trusts of \$4,487 despite the difficult times.

Particular mention should be made of the \$5,000 grant from William Buckland Foundation towards the cost of operating the Information and Advisory Service.

From all this it can be seen that an operation deficit of \$10,693 added to last year's deficit of \$4,824 indicates a most serious state of financial affairs.

Your Executive was forced to redeem investments which were the result of a bequest, and, but for this bequest two years ago, your Council would have run out of funds in the middle of the year.

Every effort has been made to cut back

on expenditure and to reduce services but at a time when the social climate indicates a growing need for support for the aged it is not possible to reduce staff any more.

Our Commonwealth grant has decreased over the last four years at a time when inflation has effectively eroded its purchasing power. Other areas have not kept up with inflation.

Much time and discussion at Committee level has been devoted to methods of increasing income but this coming year is the critical one. Our reserves are gone and expenditure is rising.

As the Council must continue "to promote the welfare and good of all ageing people in the State of Victoria", more finance must be found. It is not acceptable that the work that has been carried on over the past 25 years should be allowed to cease or to decrease because funds cannot be found to enable a voluntary organisation to continue to promote the welfare of more than 10% of the State's population.

## TALBOT ESTATE

During the year the Executive Committee received two instalments from a bequest from the Estate of the late Arnold Hope Talbot. Further income is expected in 1977.

The terms of the bequest are: "... for charitable purposes specifically in the Shire of Frankston for elderly people who shall be bona fide residents of such Shire in a form to be known as THE A. H. TALBOT REQUEST..."

and the Committee has begun investigation and discussion as to the best method to achieve the optimum result.

# VICTORIAN CONSULTATIVE COMMITTEE ON SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

Since the formation of this Committee your Council has been actively involved representing the aged care sector.

Our Representative has also been involved, in sub-committees on Integration of Health and Welfare and the Australian Assistance Plan.

- (b) The principal activity of the Council in the course of the year ended 31st December, 1976 is generally to promote and assist the welfare and good of all ageing people in the State of Victoria. There has been no significant change in the nature of this activity during that period.
- (c) The net operating deficit of the Council for the year is \$10,693.
- (d) There have been no material transfers to or from reserves or provisions by the Council during the year ended 31st December, 1976, other than as disclosed in the accounts.
- (e) No shares or debentures have been issued by the Council during the year ended 31st December, 1976.
- (f) In accordance with the provisions of the Memorandum of Association the Committee do not recommend any amount to be paid by way of final dividend and no dividend has been declared or paid since the end of the previous financial year.
- (g) The Committee (before the Revenue Statement and Balance Sheet were made out) took reasonable steps to ascertain what action had been taken in relation to the writing off of bad debts and the making of provision for doubtful debts, and satisfied themselves that there are no bad debts to be written off and that no provision is required to be made for doubtful debts.
- (h) At the date of this report, the Committee is not aware of any circumstances which would render the amount written off for bad debts, or the amount of the provision for doubtful debts for the Council inadequate to any substantial extent.
- (i) The Committee (before the Revenue Statement and Balance Sheet were made out) took reasonable steps to ascertain whether any current assets were unlikely to realise in the ordinary course of business their value as shown in the accounting records of the Council and formed an opinion that no such current asset was unlikely to realise that value in the ordinary course of business.
- The Committee is not aware of any circumstances which would render the value attributable to current assets in the accounts misleading.

- (n) The results of the Council's operations during the year ended 31st December, 1976 were not, in the opinion of the Committee, substantially affected by any item, transaction or event of a material or unusual nature.
- (o) There has not arisen in the interval between the 31st December, 1976 and the date of this report any item, transaction or event of a material and unusual nature likely, in the opinion of the Committee, to affect substantially the results of the Council's operations in the year to 31st December, 1977.

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
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
