
Victorian Council on the Ageing Twenty-Eighth Annual Report 1979

TO MEMBERS AND CONTRIBUTORS

The last 12 months once again presented many challenges to the Council, the main one arising out of the sudden death of Mr J. Peddlesden, on March 27th, 1979, only a few days before the last Annual General Meeting.

An obituary, prepared by Miss Isobel Strahan, is included elsewhere in this Report. Messages of condolence were received in the office for many weeks after his death. Jim will be sadly missed not only by Members and Staff of the Council, but also by many others in the wider community who grew to love and respect him as one of the leaders in the field working for better conditions for the aged.

The Executive on behalf of Members and the Staff would like to place on record their appreciation of Mr Peddlesden's contribution to the work of the ageing during the ten years he was Director of the Council, as well as their sympathy for Mrs H. Peddlesden and her family.

Mr J. Crisp (then Chief Executive of the Australian Council on the Ageing) gave invaluable support to the staff during the ensuing seven weeks before a new appointment was made; and continued his assistance in many ways for the rest of the year.

At the Executive Meeting on May 17th, 1979, Mrs Anne Fulcher was appointed the new Director. Mrs Fulcher had joined the Council in October, 1978, as Social Worker following the resignation of Miss Isobel Strahan, earlier that year.

Existing funds did not allow for the appointment of a full time social worker to replace Mrs Fulcher. However, Mrs Joyce Speedy who was working two days a week increased

this to three days.

In spite of severely reduced staff resources, the work of the Council not only continued but grew, with Executive and staff responding to new initiatives and challenges.

During 1979 expenditure was up approximately 40% higher than the previous year; the main increase being in the area of salaries which included a payment to Mr Peddlesden's estate for untaken long service and annual leave.

Further approaches to the State Government resulted in an additional grant of \$10,000; this along with \$20,000 received in the first half of 1979 (for the 1978/79 financial year), and \$20,000 received in the second half of 1979 (for the 1979/80 financial year) helped greatly to limit the deficit to \$3,157 for the financial year (\$78 higher than the previous year).

Special Grants received have enabled the *Foster Grandparent Scheme* to continue, but regrettably there is no guarantee of ongoing funding for it to continue after June 30th, let alone expand its work.

Additional grants from the Brotherhood of St. Laurence enabled the *Research Study into Resident Funded Housing* to proceed, as well as the preparation of an *Annotated Bibliography on Early Retirement*.

The first of what is to be an annual grant of \$500 was received from Miss Isobel Strahan towards the establishment of the A. J. Peddlesden Memorial Library. This will be established during the current year after re-organisation of office space.

The visit to Melbourne in August, 1979, of Maggie Kuhn, primarily to attend the Third International Community Education Conference resulted in a wider public recognition of the potential role that can be played by aged members of our community.

Her speech at a Public Meeting in the Melbourne Town Hall inspired those present to take initial steps to set up a branch of *V.O.T.E.*, (Voice of the Elderly) in Victoria.

Other initiatives in the last 12 months include:

- Extension of the Over 60's Forum, which is run in conjunction with the Council of Adult Education, to Nunawading.
- The establishment of the first Regional Council on the Ageing in Region 14 (see Regional Councils).
- A Seminar on Meals on Wheels.
- The introduction of the 'VCOTA News Bulletin', which is published on a monthly basis from February to December, inclusive.
- The design of a Resource Information Bank.
- The formation of an Advisory Panel consisting of experts in various fields.
- Proposals to make appropriate changes to the Articles to streamline and include changes brought about by the review of role and structure of the Council. The suggested amendments will be put to members at a future Quarterly Meeting.

During the year the Early Planning for Retirement Association continued its link with VCOTA by remaining in the same location. The Director was recently appointed a member of its Council.

The Council, through the Director, is currently a member of the Victorian Family Policy Task Force.

The Chairman, Mr Neville Brooke, represented VCOTA on the Victorian Consultative Committee on Social Development, and was its Chairman during 1979.

In addition the Council was one of the sponsoring organisations to the Report of the "Voluntary Associations and Funding Issues Working Party".

MEETINGS OF COUNCIL (Extra-Ordinary General Meetings)

The Annual General Meeting and three Quarterly Council Meetings were held during the year. The showing of a film following lunch has become a regular feature.

OBITUARY FOR THE DEATH OF MR A. J. PEDDLESDEN

The Victorian Council on the Ageing suffered a great loss in the sudden death of Mr A. J. Peddlesden, on March 27th, 1979.

Jim, as he was affectionately known to everyone, came to the Council in October, 1969, bringing a wealth of knowledge and experience, not only in hospital management, but also in the field of aged care, having left his position as Administrator of "Alexander" – a home and hospital for the aged — to be Director of the Council, under his leadership it grew and developed.

He was loved and respected by all who knew and worked with him.

He had vision, imagination, sincerity and a tremendous capacity for enthusing others and working with them. He had so much drive and such magnetic vitality. He served on innumerable public and Council committees, chairing many of them; including the steering committee of the Victorian Consultative Council for Social Development. His advice and opinions were sought by Members of Parliament, the media, senior' citizens' clubs, organisations and individuals. He made the Victorian Council on the Ageing the leading consultative body on aged care. Above all, he cared about people. and in spite of his busy life he always found time to listen to and help individual people. particularly old ones.



Those who work in the field of aged care and the aged people of Victoria own him a tremendous debt. He gave not only of his knowledge but so much of himself to his work. He was loved not only for what he did, but above all for what he himself was as a person.

He was a member of the Melbourne Rotary Club, won a Churchill Fellowship in 1974, and the Federal Government awarded him a Jubilee Medal for his work for the aged. "Greater love hath no man than this that he lay down his life for others". It was just this that Jim did.

During the year the Executive and members were saddened by the sudden death of *Mr S. Stevens* on October 13th, 1979. He was a past Chairman of the Council (1970-75), and had served as a member of the Executive since 1968. At the time of his death he was Chairman of the Advisory Committee on Equal Opportunities.

Mrs Ann Pilcher resigned from the Executive in July, due to her taking sabbatical leave. The Council looks forward to her return in May, 1980, and future involvement in VCOTA's work.

Dr Cees Van Tigglen also resigned his position as a co-opted Member of the Executive in mid-1979, due to his transfer to S.W. Gippsland. He represented the Mental Health Division of the Health Commission. His contribution to the aged in the Psycho-Geriatric field has been widely acclaimed, not only in Victoria but throughout Australia.

Dame Ada Norris, who was one of the founder members of the Victorian Old Peoples Welfare Council in 1951, has served on the Executive Committee as Vice-Chairman since that time. On this occasion she has not offered herself for re-election. and the Council and its members will greatly miss her direct involvement in the Council's work. Over the years she has brought a wealth of knowledge and insight to the Council and the field of the ageing. Her continuing involvement in VCOTA as a Life Member will ensure her ongoing participation. It is hoped that she will be closely associated with the writing of a book on the history of the Council.

Both Mrs Dorothy Eaton and Mrs R. Fraser are not offering themselves for re-election. The Council would like to place on record its appreciation of their contribution as

members of the Executive Committee. Mrs Eaton who has been Chairman of the Foster Grandparents Committee for the last 12 months will be continuing in this capacity.

ACCOMMODATION

Over the preceeding 12 months a number of informal meetings were held with workers in the field concerned about the standards of Special Accommodation Houses and Nursing Homes. These matters will be followed up in 1980 through the establishment of an overall Advisory Committee on Accommodation, bringing together representatives of groups, organisations, government departments already involved in or concerned with various aspects of accommodation.

In addition the Council held a number of informal meetings to discuss the feasibility of establishing Abbeyfield in Australia. The Abbeyfield Society has been in existence in the U.K. for many years and provides 'boarding-house' type accommodation for its residents. A small work group is currently investigating the matter further, as to its relevance or adaptation to Australian requirements.

AIMS, STRUCTURE AND FUNCTION OF THE COUNCIL

Prior to and following the 1979 Annual General Meeting, the Council has been reviewing its general aim, structure and function.

Although it is bound legally by the objects in the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Executive Committee has adopted the following overall aim:

"ADVOCACY FOR AND WITH THE AGED TO ENHANCE AND DEVELOP THEIR ROLE IN SOCIETY."

In addition, the Council's roles have been clarified and are now as follows:

Advocacy

Monitoring of services/resources

Research

Education

Co-ordination

Resources Information

Any other areas of work will be planned on a pilot/project basis and funded accordingly.

Consultations are currently taking place with the Council's solicitors to make appropriate changes to the Articles of Association. which will be presented to members at a forthcoming Quarterly Council Meeting (Extraordinary General Meeting). These include changing the title of 'Chairman' to 'President': 'Vice-Chairman' (4) to 'Vice-President' (1); 'Executive Committee' to 'Board of Management' with a maximum of 12 members; provision for an 'Executive Committee' to meet between Board of Management Meetings — with the latter to meet bi-monthly; deletion of all reference to 'Associate Members', therefore giving full voting rights to all members; and provision for the establishment of Regional Councils on the Ageing as an integral part of the Council (currently there is an indirect provision for these but it is not specific).

Advisory Committees are being developed on a more formalised basis with the intention that Committee members be representative of organisations, associations and government departments, with particular emphasis on consumer representation.

An Advisory Panel of 'experts' in various fields is also being built up. Such people are willing to be consulted on matters relevant to their area of knowledge on a voluntary

basis. However, should detailed work be required, it is anticipated that they will receive fee for service.

Dissemination of information has received some attention through the year. The introduction of the VCOTA News Bulletin is one step in this direction. It is hoped that this document will become more news/action rather than article oriented. Contributions are continuously sought.

ADVISORY AND COUNSELLING SERVICE

This continues to be an important part of the Council's work being of benefit to old people, their relatives and workers in the field.

Mrs Joyce Speedy has taken on the responsibility for the service, working mainly three days a week. Approximately 2000 enquiries were handled during 1979, with the majority relating to accommodation of all forms.

Counselling is required to some extent in most instances but to great depth in many cases.

Emphasis is placed on assessment in an attempt to ensure that people are not placed in inappropriate forms of accommodation thus perpetuating dependence.

The Council feels that help provided through this service should be available at the local level, and whenever possible such referrals are made. However, only a limited number of municipalities have sufficient staff to provide this service. During the next few months discussions will take place with relevant bodies in an attempt to rationalise existing services.

COMMUNITY LIAISON OFFICER

During the year Mr Lou Whimpey's title of Field Officer has changed to that of Community Liaison Officer. His task is enormous and at this stage it is not possible to give adequate service to all member organisations. During the year 60 Senior Citizens Clubs were visited throughout the State by Mr Whimpey. In addition he attended/participated in a number of conferences, meetings and projects on behalf of the Council.

He continues to be responsible for the production of 'Golden Years' and assists with the 'News Bulletin', as well as many other general tasks delegated to him.

DOMICILIARY CARE

A number of meetings of this Advisory Committee were held in early 1979 following the release of the Report of the Premier's Working Party — resulting in a well attended Public Meeting on the issue.

Due to pressure of work on the part of the Director, the Committee went into abeyance for the rest of the year. It has now been revived with the intention of following through the many factors in this very significant area of service for the aged and others in the community.

EARLY RETIREMENT

In mid 1979, with a grant from the Brother-hood of St. Laurence, the Council commissioned Mrs Val Maxwell (M.A.) to research the area of early retirement and produce an annotated bibliography.

This result is a valuable annotated collection of material from diverse sources which not only gives the reader an overview of an important and hitherto neglected subject area, but also provides a solid foundation upon which further more extensive studies can be mounted.

The bibliography is entitled "Early Retirement in Australia — Trends and Issues for the 80's", and will shortly be launched by the Council and available for sale.

EQUAL OPPORTUNITIES

A preliminary survey on areas in which the aged were discriminated against was conducted by this Advisory Committee in the early part of 1979.

Unfortunately, once again due to pressure off work on the part of the Director, the Committee went into abeyance. Once staff resources are improved the Committee will be reconvened under a new Chairman, following the death of Mr S. Stevens in October, 1979.

FOSTER GRANDPARENT SCHEME

The Foster Grandparent Scheme is now in its third year of operation. The Committee responsible for the Scheme is a sub-Committee of the Victorian Council on the Ageing with the Convenor, Mrs Dorothy Eaton, a member of the VCOTA Executive.

The Committee is fortunate in having Mrs Margaret McGregor as the Co-ordinator of the Scheme. Mrs McGregor is an experienced social worker with expertise in the field of both child and aged care and in work with volunteers. Her commitment to the

Scheme and all those involved, and her untiring efforts to gain continuing financial support for the Scheme has made the Committee's task a much easier one than it would otherwise have been.

Copies of the "Evaluation of the Second Year Foster Grandparent Scheme" by Mrs McGregor are now available at the VCOTA offices and provide a comprehensive description and analysis of the Scheme.

At present, the Scheme operates in two institutions for handicapped children: St. Nicholas Hospital in Carlton and the Yooralla Society of Victoria's Balwyn hostel. Twenty nine foster grandparents, who work up to 20 hours per week and are paid \$1.00 per hour, care for 58 children. Lack of finance has prevented our Scheme recruiting more foster grandparents to care for more of the children in these institutions.

There is no doubt that the Scheme benefits all involved: the foster grandparents, the children, and their relatives, staff and the organisation. Foster grandparents have found a new feeling of usefulness; children extra individual love and attention, and staff support in their demanding job. The feelings of relatives may be summed up by that of one mother who on the death of her child, wrote "If it were only possible for each foster grandparent to stand briefly in the shoes of any of the parents of children like those at St. Nicholas and have direct insight into their feelings, fears and sorros, you would know, without doubt, that without people such as yourselves, our society would be greatly poorer."

However, the great problem that has faced the Committee is that, notwithstanding the potential of the Scheme and the interest it has generated, there is, to date, no guarantee of continuing finance. The Scheme has, up to now, been financed from Trust Funds and grants from Government sources, including a once only \$10,000 grant to Yooralla Society for the Scheme in recognition of the Year of the Child.

Thanks to the efforts of Mrs McGregor and Mr Frank Webber, Secretary/Treasurer of the Committee, all relevant Government bodies have been approached, all State members of Parliament been written to and many personal visits made to Ministers and senior Departmental staff. Although all approached have expressed appreciation of the great worth of the Scheme, no continuing financial commitment has yet been made by either State of Commonwealth Government.

Present funds will keep the Scheme going until June and further ad hoc grants may keep the Scheme going for longer. However, until the Scheme has a guaranteed annual income, it cannot plan constructively either to continue or to expand. The Foster Grandparents Scheme has been a success both for the children who have received extra love and attention and for the older people whose value to the community has been recognised and appreciated. The time is ripe for expansion, to spread these benefits to other children and other older people. The finance required is very small compared with other welfare expenditure but without a reasonable surety of income. it is possible neither to plan for the future nor to maintain the present level of activities. The pressing need is a guarantee of financial income.

MEALS ON WHEELS

Representatives of Meals on Wheels Supervisors worked with the Council in planning a Seminar in October, 1979, entitled "Yesterday, Today and Tomorrow?"

Approximately 120 people attended, with over 30 registrants from country areas.

The Seminar was intended to be an issue raising event. The papers presented and ensuing discussion highlighted a wide range of issues that needed closer attention. (Copies of proceedings are available from VCOTA office).

The two main recommendations resulting from the Seminar were the setting up of an Advisory Committee on Meals on Wheels to follow through issues raised, as well as the formation of an Association of Meals on Wheels Supervisors. Both are currently being implemented.

MIGRANTS

As reported earlier, two of the Quarterly Council Meetings in 1979 provided an opportunity for members to hear speakers from a number of ethnic groups tell of the problems encountered by ethnic aged and the steps that had been or were being taken to attempt to find solutions.

Our purpose was to find out what role the Council could play in this area, yet at the same time ensure that it didn't duplicate work already being carried out.

It is planned to call a meeting in the near future to discuss this aim and to plan appropriate action.

PLANNING FOR RETIREMENT

In most other States and Territories, planning for retirement is an area of responsibility of Councils on the Ageing. In Victoria this is very largely carried out by the Early Planning for Retirement Association.

Mr Jim Peddlesden, was one of the founders of this Association, thus providing an important link with VCOTA which is still maintained even though VCOTA no longer services it. The Director in a limited way has been involved in speaking at courses on planning for retirement, as well as being appointed to the EPRA Council.

RECREATION AND EDUCATION

This is one of the most recent Advisory Committees to be established, its membership has been drawn from a wide range of organisations and departments or bodies concerned with or involved in this very vital area relating to the ageing.

The Committee is currently working on its programme for the year. At this state it is anticipated that a workshop on a specific area of recreation/education will be held later in the year.

REGIONAL COUNCILS

Towards the end of 1979 VCOTA established its first Regional Council on the Ageing in Region 14, which includes the municipalities of Diamond Valley, Eltham, Heidelberg, Northcote, Preston and Whittlesea.

This followed an approach from the Aged Services Committee of the Region which had originally been set up under the dual auspices of the Regional Organisation of Councils and the Regional Consultative Committee of the Family and Community Services Programme. The former decided to reduce its number of Committees.

Knowing of VCOTA's interest in regionalisation, the Aged Services Committee approached VCOTA to start the Regional Council which as a pilot region is developing a structure and function that could be a model for other Regional Councils. In addition, it is continuing its work in the areas of accommodation, resource information and a model for the rationalisation of services in the Region. It also is maintaining a functional relationship with FACS by acting as its Standing Committee on the Aged.

Following this move two other areas in the country have shown interest in the setting up of Regional Councils on the Ageing.

RESIDENT FUNDED HOUSING

The Advisory Committee presented the initial Report to the Executive Committee in mid-1979. It was decided, however, that wider consultations should be conducted on the content, findings and recommendations in the "Draft Report". Four Workshops were held involving a number of people representative of all aspects of resident funded housing. A Public Seminar was held in October.

The Report is now in its final stages of production with the intention of being released in late April, 1980. Special thanks must go to all Committee members, and to the Research Officer, Mr Brian Kidd, for the time and work they have put in to this important project. In addition, the Council

- (d) There have been no material transfers to or from reserves or provisions by the Council during the year ended 31st December, 1979, other than as disclosed in the accounts.
- (e) No shares or debentures have been issued by the Council during the year ended 31st December, 1979.
- (f) In accordance with the provisions of the Memorandum of Association the Committee do not recommend any amount to be paid by way of final dividend and no dividend has been declared or paid since the end of the previous financial year.
- (g) The Committee (before the Revenue Statement and Balance Sheet were made out) took reasonable steps to ascertain what action had been taken in relation to the writing off of bad debts and the making of provision for doubtful debts, and satisfied themselves that there are no bad debts to be written off and that no provision is required to be made for doubtful debts.
- (h) At the date of this report, the Committee is not aware of any circumstances which would render the amount written off for bad debts, or the amount of the provision for doubtful debts for the Council inadequate to any substantial extent.
- (i) The Committee (before the Revenue Statement and Balance Sheet were made out) took reasonable steps to ascertain whether any current assets were unlikely to realise in the ordinary course of business their value as shown in the accounting records of the Council and formed an opinion that no such current asset was unlikely to realize that value in the ordinary course of business.

would like to thank Mr R. Morris (retired Management Consultant) for his guidance and contribution to the final Report, and those who have participated in the Workshops as well as those who gave their services on a professional basis.

RESOURCE INFORMATION BANK

The Council is currently investigating the establishment of a Resource Information Bank, relating specifically to resources available to aged persons in Victoria. This has two primary areas:

- 1) To provide planning data;
- ii) To provide information of specific resources.

Material has been sent to a number of individuals and members, requesting their comments/assistance with the planning process.

Liaison is also being made with the major 'information' bodies in an attempt to link in with recent and new developments being planned in this area. Members will be kept informed of its progress through the News Bulletin.

SALES

Cook Books - "Cooking for One or Two"

Demand for this continues and a further 3000 copies were ordered during the year. Consideration is being given to having further editions produced in larger print.

Diaries

For the first time VCOTA had diaries for sale at \$1 each. Unfortunately, delivery occurred just prior to Christmas, which left it late for the distribution.

The possibility of producing a large print diary in 1981 is being investigated, including a list of major services for the aged.

STUDENTS

During the year four social work students — two from La Trobe and two from Monash, had fieldwork placements with the Council. Further long term placements have been deferred until an Associate Director can be appointed and can take responsibility for their supervision.

The Council receives many requests from other students in a number of fields and at varying levels of training for information on VCOTA as well as on the aged and aged services.

Consideration is being given to programmes for students from a wide range of disciplines. It is felt that the possible 'mixing' of students at lectures and seminars on the aged could have enormous value in preparation of their entry into the workforce and working with other professions.

TRANSPORT

Towards the end of 1979 the Director joined a deputation to the Minister of Transport regarding access of the handicapped to public transport. The Minister was most receptive to the matters raised and invited those present to act as an Advisory Group

to the Ministry on the design of future transport as well as possible adaptations to existing transport.

V.O.T.E. (Voice of the Elderly)

Following the establishment of V.O.T.E. in New South Wales, in mid-1979, a Victorian Branch was initiated in August, 1979, after a Public Meeting at Melbourne Town Hall at which Ms Maggie Kuhn was the Guest Speaker, during her short visit to Melbourne to attend the Third International Community Education Conference.

A second Public Meeting was held in November, 1979, at which the Memorandum and Articles of Association were adopted. An Interim Committee, appointed by the subscribers, is currently working on the structure and function of the organisation with a view to setting up local groups — the first one is expected in Region 14.

CONCLUSION

The Council, wherever possible, attempts to respond to requests for action, support, investigation and involvement in a wide range of areas. However, due to limited resources it has not been possible to be involved in or follow through many areas concerning the aged that require attention. It is hoped that this can be corrected in 1980.

It firmly believes that it should reflect and act on matters referred to it from all levels but, inparticular, it is vital that the aged themselves see VCOTA as a body that truly represents their needs and role in society.
