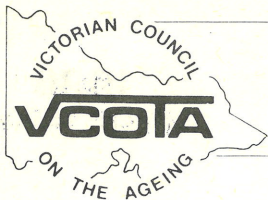

THE VICTORIAN COUNCIL ON THE AGEING, registered as a non-profit organisation under the Companies (Victoria) Code and affiliated with the Australian Council on the Ageing, draws its membership from voluntary organisations, local government, State governments, senior citizens' clubs, private enterprise and the community at large. Members elect an Executive Committee which is responsible for its function.

OBJECTIVES

The overall objective of the Victorian Council on the Ageing (VCOTA) is to represent the needs of all ageing people in Victoria.

To ensure that all people, as they grow older, can look forward to a life of dignity, security and one which will enhance and develop their role in society, taking into account their individual economic, social, cultural and medical situations.

To ensure that all present and future goods and services provided by government, the voluntary sector and private enterprise MEET THE INDIVIDUAL NEEDS OF RETIRED PEOPLE.

ROLES

Advocacy: To represent and, where appropriate, advocate the views and needs of ageing people.

Monitoring: To monitor the suitability of services and resources available to ageing people.

Education: To educate society to understand and respect the characteristics of the ageing sector, through courses, seminars, lectures, media advertising and publishing.

Co-ordination: To identify co-ordination in the planning and provision of services at all levels.

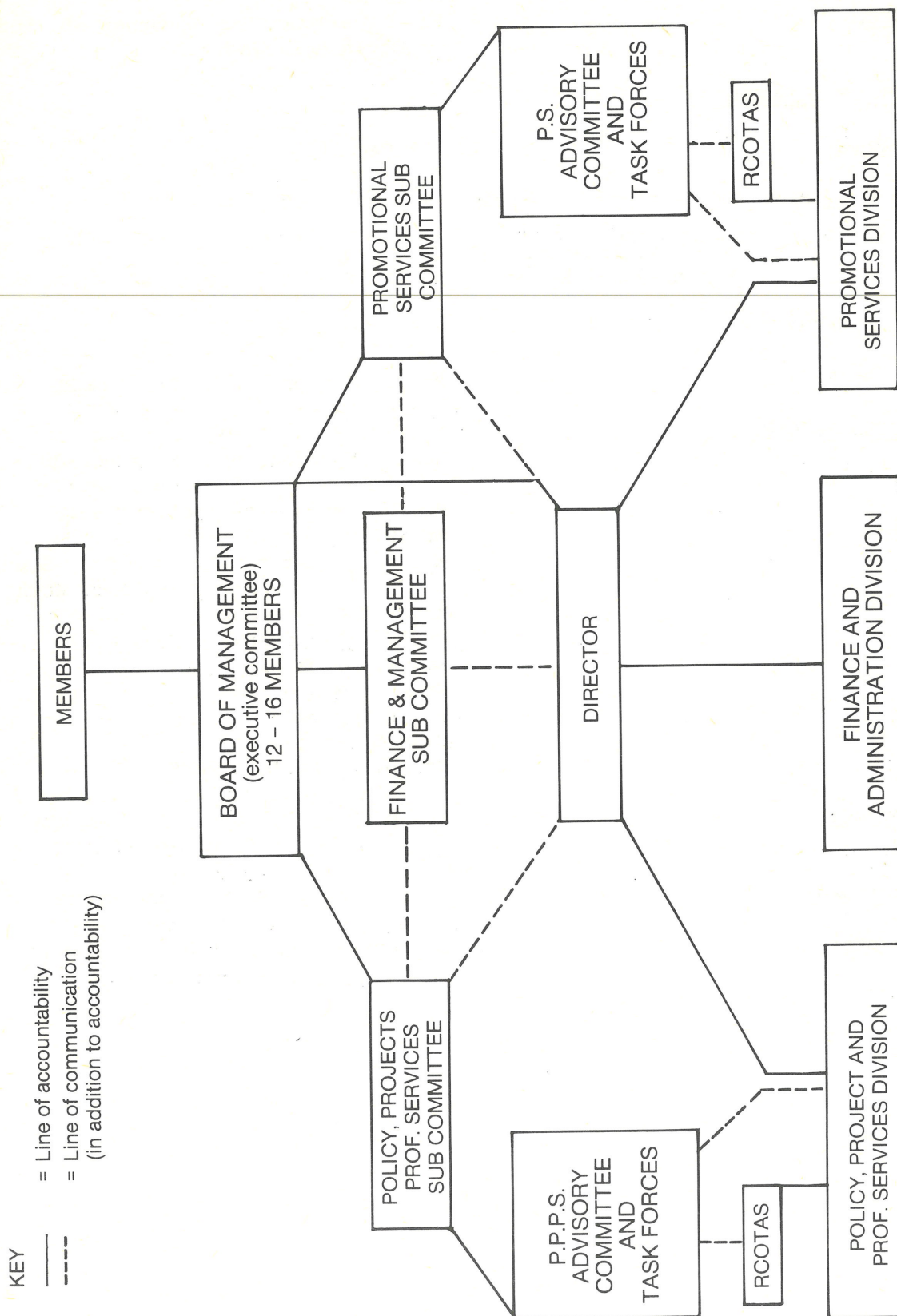
Research: To identify research needs and priorities and to disseminate the results of research relating to ageing people.

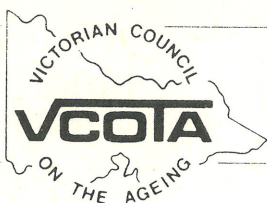
Information: To develop and maintain a resource base of relevant information to assist VCOTA and other bodies, to plan and provide services that are appropriate to the ageing.

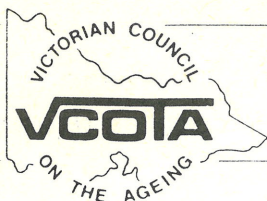

During 1986 VCOTA made a number of significant changes to its operation resulting from the recommendations included in the Director's Report entitled "Future Directions".

These included the launching in May of VCOTA's LIVING BUREAU by Mr. Bob Ansett and the appointment of an Assistant Director, Policy, Projects and Professional Services.

VCOTA'S LIVING BUREAU, a commercial initiative, was introduced to provide a range of specially negotiated goods and services that would be of benefit to older people both financially and from a quality view point.

Out of the services introduced so far, the 'COTA MATURE OUTLOOK' Insurance covering building, contents and vehicle insurance, has been the most utilised. The premiums are extremely favourable and can present a real saving in monetary terms.

The Financial Planning and Investment Advisory service has also been of great assistance to clients, in particular those retired people with smaller amounts to invest.

The other three services introduced at VCOTA's LIVING BUREAU launching covered travel, legal and real estate advice, have been slower in developing and as a result are currently under review.

In 1987 we will be launching VCOTA's Prepaid Funeral Plan in conjunction with Le Pines. Whilst this is a somewhat sensitive area, we believe that it will be of great assistance to those people who wish to plan ahead.

The appointment of Mr. Ray Judd as Assistant Director of Policy, Projects and Professional Services in May 1986 enabled VCOTA's involvement in the policy issues area to be carried out with greater depth and coverage. As always work in the area of improving quality of life and quality of care for all older Victorians is VCOTA's major priority. Further details of this are covered in the Director's and VCOTA Activities reports.

VCOTA's Advisory and Counselling Service, which provides information and guidance to older people, their families and workers in the field, continues to perform an increasingly valuable role. More recently, the Social Worker has been assisting people with personal retirement planning, covering housing, leisure activities and personal adjustment.

I am personally aware of some criticisms towards VCOTA's ventures into the commercial field and as a result I would like to take this opportunity of explaining the rationale behind its development. The sole reason was and is as mentioned earlier to provide services which would be beneficial to older people both financially and to their quality of life.

In 1984 and 1985 VCOTA received two donations in the form of bequests. The rising costs of maintaining VCOTA's existing operation persuaded the then Executive Committee to use this income to cover operational costs.

Although the Victorian Government Grants over the years have been increased marginally, they have not kept pace with inflation. Therefore in late 1985

it was agreed that new means of fund raising had to be found if VCOTA was to maintain its operation and expand its impact in the policy issues area.

The Victorian Government had in fact encouraged the exploration of additional avenues of funding. Many months of research and planning went into the introduction of VCOTA's LIVING BUREAU and whilst returns are coming in slower than originally expected, we believe in the long run they should form a significant part of VCOTA's income.

VCOTA is not the only community services organisation facing financial constraints. Although the last twelve months has seen the appointment of an Assistant Director of Policy, Projects and Professional Services, the Administrative Manager was not replaced and the Accounts Officer's hours reduced.

The road ahead is still a challenge, but whatever inroads we make into the commercial field, the ultimate reason for this is to enable VCOTA to play an ever increasing and effective role in the aged field.

We were saddened to learn that Mrs. Marchant-Penfold and Mr. S.A.F. Pond had passed away in late 1986. Both had been Life Members of VCOTA for many years in recognition of their major contributions to the development of the Council since its inception.

In conclusion I would once again wish to express my appreciation for the support of both past and present Board members, the Director and her staff for their respective contribution to VCOTA's work during the year and to all VCOTA members and companies who have assisted financially throughout the last twelve months.

VCOTA's operation over the last twelve months has caused changes in staff responsibilities and work loads. It has been a period of increased activity in a wide range of areas.

VCOTA's first priority is to influence Government and Service Providers in the planning, provision and delivery of services to older people and their carers. The appointment of Mr. Ray Judd as Assistant Director of Policy, Projects and Professional Services has enabled VCOTA to play a more effective role in this area, as is evidenced elsewhere in the Annual Report.

Following the retirement of Mrs. Joyce Speedy in August and the resignation of Mrs. Janet South, who shared the full-time Social Work position, Mrs. Sara Orton was appointed to the full-time position in charge of VCOTA's Advisory and Counselling Service. This position is 50% funded by a Home and Community Care Program - Community Services grant. Officer grant.

In April 1986 Miss Paula McLachlan was appointed to the position of Receptionist/Secretary. This being her first job since leaving school, Paula plays a very important role as the 'front-door' to VCOTA as well as coping with the majority of typing including the operation of the word processor. Due to the significantly increased work load in this area she has been assisted by Mrs. M. Hall (to July 1986) and Mrs. S. Fenemor (from July 1986) two days a week.

In June The Administration Manager, Mr. Tony Austin, resigned to take up a more senior position, and was unfortunately not replaced due to financial constraints.

VCOTA's 'new-look' News Bulletin which is now funded through advertising, provides a wider coverage of VCOTA's activities and matters of interest and benefit to older people. Most of all it provides a medium of improved communication to members.

The provision of "COTA Mature Outlook" Insurance on building, contents and motor vehicles has without doubt attracted a significantly increased number of older people as VCOTA members, as evidenced at the rear of this Report. The increased membership base is vital if VCOTA is to truly represent the needs and aspirations of people as they grow older. The Financial Planning and Investment Advisory Service provided through Bondmark has assisted many older people who may have moderate assets. Their appreciation of VCOTA's Services has been expressed in many ways.

The increased emphasis on matters and issues that help people to remain independent as long as possible, is vital if VCOTA is going to play its part responsibly in ensuring that services in areas are responsive to individual personal needs.


During the year VCOTA has been pleased to meet with visitors from overseas - Japan, Singapore, Hong Kong, New Zealand and Canada. Media coverage also increased dramatically over the year.

Staff have again filled many commitments; speaking at different locations throughout the State as well as presenting papers or chairing Conferences and Seminars.

Consultancy work to organisations, companies, developers and some sections of Government continues to be an important part of our work. The current introduction of the Retirement Villages Act in 1987, and its impact on residents and operators will require VCOTA to play a significant role in the interest of all parties. Another example of this area of work was my involvement as Chairman of an Investigating Panel set-up by Euroa Shire Council to look into matters at Euroaville Hostel.

Once again we wish to thank all those people who have assisted VCOTA over that last year in many different ways. It is not possible to cover everyone by name, however it would be remiss not to include the following:

- The Victorian State Government for their financial assistance and their continuation of Senior Citizens Week;
- Those who gave donations to assist VCOTA in its work, including Trust Companies, Sponsors - in particular Advance Asset Management - Supporters and the many individuals.

- Mr. Graham Stevens and staff at Duesbury's for auditing VCOTA's accounts at a reduced rate.

- All those who have given their time, knowledge and experience as members of committees, task forces and Regional Councils to further the work of VCOTA in the interest of older people.

POLICY, PROJECTS AND PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

The 1985 Annual Report highlighted the developments proposed in order to upgrade the effectiveness of VCOTA's operation on behalf of older people. Central to those development proposals was the creation of a Policy, Projects and Professional Services Division within VCOTA. The primary roles of the Division are to:

- represent the needs of older people to government and the community;
- provide an advise and counselling service for older people their families and carers;
- to provide a range of information services to older people and the community.

The development of the division commenced in May with the appointment of Mr. Ray Judd to the position of Assistant Director responsible for the division. The major activities undertaken since that time have been:

PLANNING THE WORK OF THE DIVISION

Significant time and effort has gone into establishing a framework which will guide the work of the Division. The Board of Management has adopted a set of principles and objectives and discussions are still underway to identify the most effective ways to involve the membership and other relevant groups in formulating and advocating policy. These activities are designed to ensure that VCOTA's work is:

- targeted at the critical issues affecting older people;
- reflects a considered overview of the social and economic environment;
- effectively presented to the government and the community.

GOVERNMENT POLICY AND SERVICE DEVELOPMENT

Government policies regarding aged services have been undergoing considerable change in recent years. Governments at both Commonwealth and State level are attempting to reduce the dependence on residential services to older people by expanding the range of services available to people in their own home. This reorientation of policy has involved numerous government inquiries or planning structures in which VCOTA has been involved. Some major examples are:

1. Nursing Homes and Hostels Review

In recent years a number of reports had highlighted concerns about the overdependence on nursing homes in Australia and the haphazard manner in which they are organised and supported. The Nursing Homes and Hostels Review was established to provide the Commonwealth Government with a strategy to control and manage future development of these services.

VCOTA prepared a detailed response to the document prepared by the Review. VCOTA's response emphasised the importance of ensuring that future developments in these areas be compatible with other aged services programmes and initiatives under consideration. In particular the importance of effective and appropriate assessment services was emphasised in VCOTA's Submission.

2. Home and Community Care Programme

The Home and Community Care (HACC) Programme is a joint Commonwealth and State effort to expand the provision of community care services and to develop a viable alternative to inappropriate residential care. The focus is primarily upon the expansion of domiciliary and community support services which make a positive contribution to people's capacity to live independent and satisfying lives.

HACC incorporated a number of existing programmes and provides a framework for the development of new services. VCOTA has been involved in a number of working groups established to assist in the development of the programme and particularly the new services.

VCOTA recognises that HACC is a complex new programme and it is important that the development work be undertaken carefully yet there is also considerable urgency to establish the services and to encourage the community to use them.

3. Guardianship and Administration Board

During 1986 the State Parliament passed new legislation establishing a Guardianship and Administration Board and an associated Office of Public Advocate. The purpose of the Board is to ensure that people with a disability (including disabilities which occur in old age) have a guardian to administer of their affairs appointed when necessary. The Office of Public Advocate is designed to support the work of the guardianship board and to act as an advocate on behalf of disabled people.

VCOTA has become increasingly involved in discussion regarding the establishment of both bodies and also aware of the potential

impact that they may have upon older Victorians and the services available to them. VCOTA will monitor the developments of the Board and the Public Advocate and will also keep its membership informed.

4. Retirement Villages Legislation

Last years Annual Report noted the likelihood that the State Government would initiate legislation to control Resident Funded Retirement Villages during 1986. Draft legislation was tabled in April and VCOTA conducted substantial discussions with residents and other groups before presenting the Government with a submission recommending amendments to that legislation. Revised legislation has now been enacted and VCOTA continues to be involved with the Corporate Affairs Commission in preparing regulations and related administrative structures which will be established prior to the bill being enacted.

VCOTA hopes that this legislation will provide an appropriate structure for the continued growth of this industry, at the same time protecting the rights and investments of residents.

5. Office of Intellectual Disability Services Aged Services Working Party

During 1986 the Office of Intellectual Disability Services (OIDS) established a Working Party to look at the service needs of the residents of their institutions. The Working Party met on several occasions, visited various institutions to observe the situation and talk with residents and also circulated a discussion paper. A final report is now in preparation and VCOTA looks forward to OIDS taking some positive initiatives to improve the completely unacceptable circumstances in which these people currently live.

6. Ministerial Review of Special Accommodation Houses

Concern about the quality of care provided by Special Accommodation Houses (SAHs) has existed for some time. The Minister of Health established a committee to review the standards of care available and to recommend appropriate changes to their operation.

VCOTA made both a written and verbal presentation to the committee early in its deliberations and then made a further submission following the release of its interim report. Whatever the final outcome of the review, VCOTA is aware that considerable work will be required to ensure that the supported accommodation system in this State deals appropriately with the needs of those most vulnerable people currently living in SAHs.

AGED ABUSE WORKING PARTY

Throughout 1986 VCOTA was an active member of a Working Party established to act on the issue of aged abuse. The Working Party met regularly throughout the year and has developed a project which will explore the issue of aged abuse and attempt to identify solutions. The Working Party is currently trying to raise the funds required to establish this project.

VCOTA provided the working party with support throughout the year and it was VCOTA staff who drafted the funding submission for the project. When the project is funded it will be auspiced by VCOTA with the working party acting as the Steering Committee.

FOOD AND NUTRITION PROJECT

The Health Promotions Unit of the Health Department of Victoria made available funds for projects which promoted healthier eating habits in the community. VCOTA applied for and was granted funds to establish a small project designed to assist increasingly frail people to adapt their food purchase, storage and preparation habits in order to maintain their independence and the nutritious quality of their food intake.

The project has not yet commenced as VCOTA is still undertaking the preliminary preparations to ensure its success.

NATIONAL ISSUES

VCOTA is aware that many issues affecting older people are national in scope. It is therefore important that VCOTA maintain and enhance its co-operative relationship with the Australian Council on the Ageing to ensure that our views on national issues are shared. During 1986 VCOTA has contributed particularly to ACOTA's work on the Nursing Homes and Hostels Review and to the discussion on Health Maintenance Organisations. In 1987 it is expected that a major priority will be the Income Security Review currently being undertaken by the Commonwealth Government.

INTERAGENCY LIAISON

VCOTA has maintained both formal and informal relationships with a wide range of government and non-government bodies with an interest in aged services. The list of organisations or committee on which VCOTA is officially represented is presented later in this report but it is an important part of VCOTA's role to maintain informal relationships with many organisations whose services and views may impact upon VCOTA's work.

ADVISORY AND COUNSELLING SERVICE

VCOTA's long established Advisory and Counselling Service is now a key part of the Policy, Projects and Professional Services Division. The Service continues to provide an important short term information, referral and counselling service to older people, their carers and professionals in the field. The service offers counselling and when appropriate advocacy support to older people considering or confronting changes in their lifestyle whatever they may be.

During 1986 there has been an increasing number of people seeking assistance with retirement planning in general and the continued expansion of Resident Funded Retirement Villages has meant a growth in the number of people coming to VCOTA wanting assistance and information regarding a potential move into such a village. This growth has occurred alongside continued requests from people considering moving into nursing homes, hostels, special accommodation houses or other kinds of supported housing.

The advisory service also continues to provide people with assistance on such matters as income maintenance, health and community programmes.

BEYOND THERAPY SEMINARS

VCOTA, in conjunction with the Department of Sport and Recreation, conducted two very successful seminars entitled "Beyond Therapy" during 1986. The aim of the seminar was to explore new ways of meeting the recreational needs of frail older adults, which complement the work of other professionals in the aged services field.

Over 300 people in total attended the seminars, representing workers and volunteers from all areas involved with frail older people. The feedback from those attending was extremely encouraging and it is hoped that similar seminars will be held in the future.

A video entitled "The Sky's the Limit" was produced for the seminar, portraying innovative programmes developed for frail older people. The video has been used frequently by professionals working in residential settings, day hospitals and other facilities caring for the frail aged.

EXERCISE TO MUSIC LEADERS TRAINING COURSE FOR OLDER ADULTS

The Exercise to Music Leaders Training Course for Older Adults, held in February 1986, saw another 25 leaders graduate into the community enabling many more older people to take part in non-competitive, pain-free, enjoyable exercise classes where each individual is working within their own limits.

Since the beginning of this vital program, close to 200 people have graduated and are now running classes throughout Victoria.

The VCOTA/Department of Sport and Recreation training course will continue to be run into the future with the added assistance of Frankston TAFE.

SENIOR CITIZENS WEEK

Senior Citizens Week, which was originally suggested to the Premier by VCOTA, has continued to go from strength to strength and is now in its fifth year.

Each year sees an increase in the involvement of older people, local groups, major organisations and the community at large.

Apart from representation on the Premier's Advisory Committee, VCOTA has been involved in the Week by organising information days, seminars together with VCOTA's Senior Citizen's Week Awards and Dinner.

The 1986 Dinner was held at the Southern Cross Hotel and with the generous sponsorship of Advance Asset Management, approximately 250 retired people were able to attend this marvellous function at half the normal cost.

Recipients of the Awards received trophies/prizes donated by MLC Insurance, Minet Australia, Meridian Travel, Saga Holidays, First National Real Estate Group and Bondmark Investment Services.

FOSTER GRANDPARENT SCHEME

The Victorian Council on the Ageing has continued to have representation on the Foster Grandparent Scheme Committee of Management. John Hart, VCOTA's Public Relations Officer has been assisting the Scheme with publicity and newsletter production.

Foster Grandparents are older men and women who visit children and young adults with disabilities, living in residential settings.

Over 60 Foster Grandparents are now involved in the Scheme which is operating in six centres currently.

The Foster Grandparent Scheme was originally introduced in 1977, under the co-ordination of the Victorian Council on the Ageing. The Scheme has since become independent, running under its own auspice.

NOTE 1 - STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following summary of significant accounting policies and definitions is provided to assist in the understanding of the Council's Financial Statements. The accounting policies generally follow the accounting standards issued by the Australian accounting bodies.

(a) General Basis of Accounting

The Financial Statements of the Council have been prepared in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. They have been prepared on the basis of historical costs without adjustment for either changes in the general purchasing power of the dollar or changes in the value of specific assets.

(b) Depreciation

Depreciation on Fixed Assets is calculated on the straight line method and is charged against revenue so as to provide for a write-down from cost to estimated residual value over the estimated life of the assets.

(c) Employee Benefits

Charges have been made in the Financial Statements for benefits accruing to employees in relation to annual leave and long service leave. Long service leave is accrued in respect of all employees after 5 years service at the levels prescribed by the relevant awards.

(d) Leases

The council is the lessee under a lease Agreement in respect of its premises. The Council accounts for this lease by charging the lease payment against profits and showing the remaining liability under the lease as a Contingent Liability in a note to the Financial Statements.
